

Role of the Director of Lifesaving Operations

Role: The director of lifesaving operations has overall responsibility for the club's administration services and communication.

Responsible to: The club president and board

Member of: The club board and lifesaving team

Responsibilities:

- 1. Management of the club's lifesaving teams and providing appropriate oversight of their activities
- 2. Ensuring high-quality patrols by establishing rosters with qualified members in accordance with LSV requirements
- 3. Follow-up and debrief with the patrol captain and relevant patrollers for any incidents that occur on patrol; Providing information to LSV and the club president as required
- 4. Ensure lifesaving equipment such as IRBs, boards, tubes, etc., are fit for purpose, available and appropriately maintained
- 5. Oversee the timing, rostering and execution of lifesaving award training
- 6. Reviewing and implementing any directives and policies from LSV and SLSA
- 7. Communicating as necessary with local authorities on patrol operations
- 8. Providing a report at each board meeting on their area of responsibility
- 9. Providing an annual report on their area of responsibility prior to the AGM
- 10. Liaising regularly with the president on their area of responsibility
- 11. Serving as an HLSC delegate and voting member on the LSV Lifesaving Operations Council, with meetings held monthly

Knowledge and skills:

- 1. Required
 - a. Patrolling member
 - b. Well informed about club activities
 - c. Full understanding of the club's requirements to meet its lifesaving patrol obligations according to LSV
 - d. Full understanding of the requirements for lifesaving services in all areas of their responsibility including patrolling award structures, first aid, communications, powercraft and equipment
 - e. Ability to organise and delegate effectively to their team members
 - f. High degree of leadership and strong communication skills
 - g. Ability to allocate consistent weekly effort to the performance of the responsibilities and duties described

- h. Possess a working with children check
- 2. Desirable
 - a. Hold all awards required for the club to meet its lifesaving patrol obligations
 - b. Previous office holder in the lifesaving team

Duration of appointment: Two years

Method of appointment: The director of lifesaving operations is appointed by a vote of members in an election held at an annual general meeting, in line with the club constitution.

Estimated time commitment required: 6-8 hours per week, depending on the time of year
